- Component Traceability (BTB): Under 145.A.42, improper acceptance of components by the supplies department or certifying staff voids configuration control and STC validity.
- Reporting Failures: Deficient 145.A.60 Occurrence Reporting (Internal and External) feeds the "Iceberg of Ignorance," allowing systemic aviation maintenance errors to persist.

Tooling & Facilities	145.A.25 & 145.A.40	Audit environmental conditions and calibration data rigorously to prevent physical damage to high-value aircraft structures.
Data Control	145.A.45 Maintenance Data	Train certifying staff strictly on their user responsibilities and internal reporting obligations regarding digital data control.

- Certifying Staff (B1 & B2): Must master roles, responsibilities, and QC personal obligations under 145.A.35.
- Production Planning Staff: Must execute efficient planning processes with optimal communication support under 145.A.47.
- Quality Assurance Staff: Must manage internal safety reporting schemes (145.A.202) and execute means of compliance (145.A.120).

Actionable Implementation Checklist

- Audit the existing 145.A.200 Management System against EU 2021/1963 SMS requirements.
- Standardize all 145.A.45 maintenance data control protocols.
- Implement recurrent training to continuously review EASA Part 145 major changes.
- Verify all contract and subcontract management (145.A.75 privileges) meet primary MRO standards.
